## ABOUT THE POLK COUNTY HOUSING TRUST FUND

The **Polk County Housing Trust Fund** (PCHTF) is the comprehensive planning, advocacy and funding organization for affordable housing in Polk County, Iowa.

Focused around these three core activities, PCHTF is responsible for crafting the community strategic plan for affordable housing and leading its implementation. It is also tasked with helping the community understand the need for and benefits of adequate affordable housing.

Finally, the organization is responsible for allocating community funds aimed at increasing and preserving the inventory of affordable homes in the County and improving the lives of the people who live in them.







#### **Development**

In FY-2022, PCHTF allocated \$1.9 million toward a combined \$21.2 million investment to produce and preserve housing.

Adding to the region's supply of affordable homes is one of our most important responsibilities. PCHTF distributes development funds provided by Polk County and the State Housing Trust Fund and achieved these results last year:

## **Programs & Supportive Services**

In FY-2022, we granted \$597,448 to community organizations that helped 2,099 households in need of a safe, stable home.

We fund programs that get people housed and keep them housed, including some of our community's most at-risk populations. In addition to housing support, our program partners reported these outcomes:

#### Today's Keynote Speaker



Tony Perez leads the code reform team at Opticos working with public sector planners and nationwide to customize and apply form-based zoning to allow Missing Middle Housing. Since 2000, he has authored, co-authored or peer-reviewed dozens of codes for neighborhoods, downtowns, suburban shopping center transformations, and citywide. Prior to 2000, Tony was a public sector planner in Southern California for 13 years.

#### **Housing Justice Fellowship Presentation**

Walking in Place - Memorializing Everyday Places Through Extraordinary Historical Perspectives is a documentary project by Amal Barre, a PhD candidate at the University of Amsterdam and is currently Graduate Fellow in Housing Justice at PCHTF. It is part of a larger body of work that applies collaborative storytelling and archival research to investigate the role of urban renewal policy in the displacement trajectories of families across past and present cycles of place erasure. The documentary positions everyday stories and experiences as historical moments while reflecting on how people need stable places to preserve and protect their existence. It seeks to engage a broad audience to deepen and normalize conversations about displacement, place and people erasure. Walking in Place honors oral histories by walking in place with people to expose how displacement is embedded within the built environment. It is a dance in our memories of the past, our understanding of the present, and our imagination of the future.

Walking in Place on Walker Street features Don Brown, a Des Moines based Jazz musician who tells the story of his family home located at 1434 Walker Street. The home was one of several lost to the construction of I-235 in the 1960s. The lot that housed the family is now part road and part parking lot. The film was done in partnership with Tyler Gates of ArtForce lowa.



## PROGRAM NOTES, CONTINUED

#### More than Poor and un/Housed: Designing Spaces of Care

Posters on display at today's event show work by students from the Iowa State University College of Design presenting ideas for non-congregate emergency shelter for unhoused people. Each of five teams selected an available property in the Des Moines area and designed a shelter solution for a specific group: women, families, veterans, young adults, and children. The pandemic demonstrated the need for shelter that provides people seeking assistance with not just a bed, but also private space and security. Examples include hotels, dormitories, or tiny homes. Currently, Des Moines does not have non-congregate options in its emergency shelter system. The students' work challenges us to think how shelter can also become care.
